A Play Note

WHAT WAR

Thornton Wilder, American playwright and novelist, was born in Madison, Wisconsin on April 17, 1897 and died on December 7, 1975. *Our Town* won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1938. The play's action spans the years 1899 to 1914.

John Bolger's immensely varied work has been seen in both Regional and Off-Broadway theatre venues, as well as on television.

He is a founding member of the Willow Cabin Theatre Company and has appeared with the company in the Wolf Trap and New York productions of Twelfth Night, A Midsummer Night's Dream and As You Like It. He has also appeared with the Willow Cabin in The Balcony, Macbeth and S.S. GlenCairn — Four Plays of The Sea. Mr. Bolger's other theatre credits include: Richard III at the Hartford Stage Company with Richard Thomas, The Misanthrope, Safe



Sex at La Mama, Light Up The Sky at the Roundabout, and Antony and Cleopatra at the Old Globe in San Diego. He has been seen on the television programs Guiding Light, True Blue, Top Cops, Almost Golden: The Jessica Savitch Story and N.Y.P.D. Blue and in the film, Parting Glances. John currently appears as "Gabe McNamara" on the NBC daytime drama, Another World.

Bucknell University's Sesquicentennial celebration (1846–1996) has prompted us to delve into the history of the theatre arts at Bucknell. The following chronology reveals selected:

"STAGES" OF BUCKNELL THEATRE

- 1851 First Bucknell Catalogue lists among it's course requirements:
 - sophomores have regular exercises in composition & elocution
 - juniors read essays out loud
 - seniors deliver orations in presence of faculty & students
 - Saturday afternoons are devoted exclusively to declamation and to reading select and original compositions
- 1879-1888 Informal readings of dramatic plays are presented
- 1894 The Shakespeare Club, a men's student group that presents dramatic readings of Shakespeare plays is organized
- 1901 The Men's Dramatic Club and Women's Dramatic Club are founded
- 1906 Cap & Dagger (for men) and Frill and Frown (for women), the new student dramatic clubs, are established

- 1920's courses in Dramatic Interpretation and Oral English are added to the English Department's curriculum
- 1931 Frill and Frown joins with Cap and Dagger to create one co-ed organization
- 1926-1970 Professor of English C. Willard Smith (director, designer and actor) nurtures theatre development at Bucknell through Cap and Dagger
- 1931-1958 Cap and Dagger performances are staged at the Lewisburg High School, with rehearsals in Bucknell Hall, and scenery built in

- 1949-1987 Professor of English, *Harvey Powers*, is hired; teaches the first fully accredited courses in acting, directing and theatre arts; develops a theatre concentration within the English Major which culminates in a Theatre Major; directs, acts and serves as faculty artistic advisor for Cap & Dagger; and spearheads the successful move towards the establishment of an autonomous department of theatre
- 1951 Cocktail Theatre, performed in the late afternoon, is established as Cap and Dagger's venue for producing one-act plays in Bucknell Hall
- 1954 Professor of Art, *George Hershey*, is hired to teach the first courses in Scene and Costume Design
- 1959 The Coleman Hall University Theatre is built and opens; the triumvirate: Professors C. Willard Smith, George Hersey and Harvey Powers (shown from left to right in photo) serve as the key consultants for developing the plans for this space into a state-of-the-art proscenium theatre



- 1971-85 The University Center's Cave space becomes a second Cap and Dagger venue for producing student directing and acting projects
- 1979 A Major in Theatre within the English Department's curriculum is approved
- 1985-86 The Department of Theatre is launched as a new department
- November 1986 The newly renovated Tustin Studio Theatre opens as a state-of-the-art flexible experimental black box theatre space, with it's production of Euripides' The Bacchae, dedicated to Professor Harvey Powers
- 1987-1988 Addition of the dance program transforms the existing department into *The Department of Theatre and Dance*
- 1989 A Minor in Dance within the department's curriculum is approved
- 1992 The Department of Theatre and Dance, and Cap & Dagger launch The Educational Theatre Company, which performs topical scenes, readings and dramatic works within classrooms cross-campus
- 1995-96 Cap & Dagger organizes Company which fosters student produced works in conjunction with the Department's existing season of plays, dance concerts, cocktail theatre, studio performances, residencies and workshops
