



#### DIRECTOR'S NOTES

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The Lion in Winter is more than merely a play about an era in England's past. True, it captures the power and vitality so often associated with the period of King Henry II and his Queen Eleanor of Aquitaine. The sharp wit, the devious scheeming, the deep emotion so often hidden under biting sarcasm all ar combined to revitalize the passionate characters of long ago. Indeed, Indeed, Goldman has certainly provided us with fascinating insights beyond the dusty facts in history textbooks.

However a deep historical study was not Goldman's ultimate purpose, nor is it ours. He writes in a note before the actual script, "This play, while simplifying the political maneuvering. . .is accurately based on the available data. . . .(however), the people in this play, their characters and passions, while consistent with the facts we have, are fictions. The play, finally, contains anachronisms in speech, thought, custom, and so on. Those the author is aware of. . .are deliberate and not intended to outrage the historical aspects of the script."

In our production, therefore, we have sought to balance the necessary historical accuracies—setting, costumes—with those more subtle points which are universal and relevant to all times. Indeed, the feelings expressed about war, love, jealousy, and power are just as applicable to today as they were in 1183. Perhaps this is why we are so readily able to become involved with and deeply moved by the royal characters.

The entire company of The Lion in Winter joins me in presenting our production to you this evening for your enjoyment. -S. D.


