### Director's Note

This production of As You Like It represents an ambitious attempt to create a theatrical event at a moment in which the future of theatre and live performance is uncertain. In the interest of full transparency, this production of As You Like It is also something of an accident. I originally proposed to direct an indoor production of a different Shakespearean comedy that would have relied on elaborate scenery, costumes, and lighting. When the pandemic failed to abate by the start of the academic year, my colleagues and I started to contemplate the possibility of an outdoor production and I shifted my attention to As You Like It. From a pragmatic standpoint, the play's pastoral setting and emphasis on distanced longing (especially when staged outdoors) supported the public health statues that would inform our process. Working under these restrictions required all of us to think creatively and reinvest in the origins of theatrical storytelling. Peter Brook famously claimed that an actor, spectator, and empty space are the only requirements for a theatrical event. The simplicity that Brook calls for guided our work on this production. While we still employ costumes and scenic elements, the theatre we are aiming to create doesn't attempt to manufacture verisimilitude. In our production, Bucknell's campus provides the environment (all the world's a stage) and a piece of fabric functions as a scenic element, a prop, and a form of gestural communication.

This production of *As You Like It* also represents an attempt to reimagine a Shakespearean comedy for the present day. Shakespeare's plays are notorious for trafficking in heteronormative misogyny. Through casting and textual adaptation, we've attempted an intervention that centers women and all manifestations of love. This work has been personally fulfilling as it has allowed me to envision a society in which women occupy seats of power and queerness is both normalized and celebrated. The world presented in this production is certainly not the world in which we live, but its depiction of gender and romantic relationships offers an alternate reality rooted in justice and inclusion--a model to which we might aspire.

We hope you enjoy watching this production as much as we enjoyed preparing it. We also hope it whets your appetite for more live performance. The arts writ large will need your support in the coming years. If I my students and my departmental colleagues have taught me anything it is that Bucknell's Department of Theatre and Dance will continue to find ways to create art regardless of the restrictions placed upon us.

This production is dedicated to the late Sara Eaton, one of my undergraduate mentors at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois who loved Shakespeare's plays and taught me to love them too.

# AS YOU LIKE IT Plot Synopsis by Act

#### Act I

Olivia, the eldest child of recently-deceased Sir Roland de Boys, forces her sister Orlando into a life of manual labor. In order to prove her mettle, Orlando submits a challenge to the court wrestler, Charles. When Olivia learns of the match, she instructs Charles to kill Orlando. Meanwhile, Duke Frederick, having deposed his elder sister, Duke Senior, is installed as head of state. Senior and her allies have escaped to the Forest of Arden, but her daughter, Rosalind, remains at court as a companion to Frederick's daughter, Celia. Orlando bests Charles and during the wrestling match and promptly falls in love with Rosalind, who requites her. Rosalind gives Orlando a chain to wear as a token of her love. When Orlando is warned of Olivia's plans for a second attempt on her life, she seeks refuge in the Forest of Arden. Concerned with public support for his niece, Frederick banishes Rosalind from court. Celia proposes that they also travel to the forest in disguise. Rosalind transforms herself into a young man, Ganymede, and Celia acts as his shepherdess sister, Aliena. Touchstone, the court fool, accompanies them. At the end of Act I, the audience will follow Rosalind, Celia, and Touchstone into the forest.

#### Act II

In the Forest of Arden, the weary travelers come upon Corrine, a hardworking shepherd, and the lovesick Silvius who declares unrequited love for the scornful Phoebus. Ganymede, Aliena, and Touchstone set up a new home in the forest. Not far away, and unaware of the newcomers, Duke Senior lives a simple life with her fellow exiled courtiers, Amiens and Jacques. Their picnic is interrupted by the arrival of Orlando, who seeks nourishment for herself and her servant, Madame. Duke Senior and her comrades welcome the expatriates, offering them food and shelter.

#### Act III

Still bemused by Rosalind, Orlando pens love poems to her and hangs them on trees throughout the forest. Ganymede encounters Orlando and proposes to cure Orlando of her love by teaching her to woo Ganymede as if he were Rosalind. Orlando agrees to visit Ganymede (really Rosalind) every day for lessons in love. In the meantime, Phoebus falls in love with Ganymede and writes him a letter revealing his affections. Touchstone also finds love with (and attempts to marry) the forest dwelling Audrey.

#### Act IV

During a daily wooing lesson, Celia performs an imagined wedding ceremony for Orlando and Ganymede. Orlando leaves and promises to return in two hours' time. Silvius arrives soon after and delivers Phoebus's letter. Olivia, having been dispatched to the forest to search for her sister, encounters Ganymede and Aliena and reports that Orlando saved her life, but injured herself in the process. Ganymede (still Rosalind) is overcome by her feelings for Orlando and faints. Olivia and Aliena (still Celia) and quickly fall in love. Orlando returns and announces that she is no longer interested in Ganymede's tutoring. At the same time, Phoebus and Silvius appear with Phoebus in pursuit of Ganymede and Silvius in pursuit of Phoebus. Rosalind devises a plan in which everyone will get married.

#### Act V

As Ganymede, Rosalind promises she will Phoebus, Celia will marry Olivia, and Orlando will marry Rosalind. She makes Phoebus promise that he will marry Silvius if they are not married by the end of the day. On the day of the wedding, and with the help of the god Hymen, Rosalind sheds her disguise and reappears as herself. Duke Senior blesses her marriage to Orlando, while Phoebus accepts Silvius. LeBeau, a courtier, arrives with the news that Duke Frederick has renounced the dukedom to live in a monastery. The three engaged couples, along with Touchstone and Audrey, marry amid a celebration of song and dance.




