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## WHO'S WHO IN THE CAST

The Bishop Misbehaves is the second play Elizabeth Dinsmore, '39. has directed. Her first play for Cap and Dagger was The Wind and the Rain. During the past summer, Miss Dinsmore was a member of the Duchess County Players at Poughkeepsie, N. Y. There she appeared in Sarena Blandish and A Russian Honeymoon. In addition to the work on technical production, she is best known to Bucknell audiences. for her work in Night of January 16, Twelfth Night, and The Last of Mrs. Cheyney.

George Egan, '42, (Bishop), is one of three freshmen in the cast. Previous to his enrollment at Bucknell, he was a member of the Pittsburgh Community Playhouse where he took part in Spider and Excursion. George has an undeniably bright future in Cap and Dagger. which is demonstrated by the fact that he is one of a very few freshmen who have ever merited a leading role.

Rae-Louise Schultz, '40, (Miss Lyons), will be remembered for her characterization of Maria in Twelfth Night. She is a veteran at Cap and Dagger work having appeared in Craig's Wife, Night of January 16, and The Last of Mrs. Cheyney.

John Fahringer, '40, (Donald), portrayed Mio in Winterset last year with a performance that rivaled that of Burgess Merideth. He has definite aspirations for the stage. During his two years at Bucknell, he has appeared in a great many productions including Hamlet, Twelfth Night, and Death Takes a Holiday.

Joseph Donnelly, '39, (Waller), was the mainstay of the Bucknell Junior College Theatricals at Wilkes-Barre. His role of Sir Andrew Aguecheek in Twelfth Night was acclaimed brilliant. Last season he directed Winterset.

Janet Cristadoro, '41, (Hester), has done some theatre work in New York City. The role of Hester is her first big opportunity in Cap and Dagger productions. She appeared in Night of January 16.
