Quite fortunately for playwrights but sad for us. many similar ideas and backgrounds of modern plays have never been copyrighted. Cap and Dagger selections suffer from delusions of grandeur, spaciousness, servants and wealth, while the realities of ordinary lives are relegated to oblivion. We often wonder if any American playwriter, ever heard of a decent home in our country where booze is never seen or used. We also often wonder if its more than a coincident that the same people who control Hollywood also control the liquor business. Otherwise why are ninety-nine and 44/100 percent of the movie scripts on the saloon side. They seem to be two old plugs that always team together.

Hollywood's disgusting distortions of American life are peddled around the World; her gangsters, her voluptuous characters, have little redeeming scenery to justify their existence. Export and native business have had a great fall and Hollywood is worried and retrenching. Perhaps, yet, she may see the handwriting on the wall of decent public opinion.

THE LITTLE FOXES despite its monotaneous setting is one of the finest satires we have ever read. With good acting every scene will be tense and hold your closest attention. The humor is incisive and the questions left unanswered leave little doubt of the harvests to follow. The play could just as well been named, "The Family Who Would Gain the Whole World and Sell Its Soul as a Down Payment." Birdie, Alexandra and her father would qualify as fine characters in any land or clime. They happen to be the victims of family greed. We can't explain the beautiful character of Regina, with her great love for Regina except it be some quality of soul begotten by port wine.

Recent headlines inform us, with a "nut" in the White House and "two bolts" in the South, that the Negro is still highly regarded in Dixieland, with all his potential power of exploitation. All in all *The Little Foxes* have confirmed our own convictions that Southern women can get their noses higher in the air, minus labor and physical resources, than anyone else we know.
