NOTES FROM THE LATIN AMERICAN PROJECT COLLECTIVE

Eduardo Galeano describes how the Spanish conquistadors viewed the communal lifestyle of the native population as antithetical to private ownership based on Christian imperatives. Over the last 500 years, European viceroys, as well as Latin American dictators, and land developers have utilized this initiative for destroying native communal living. The justification for this action generally revolves around the notion that communal ownership places obstacles of obscure leadership, complicated land rights and an economics bordering on Marxism and socialism in the way of "civilized" development based on private enterprise.

Like American theatre companies in the 1960's, the more revolutionary Latin American theatre companies recognized this relationship between exploitation and private property. In counterdistinction to this ethos, these theatre artists collectively develop creative work.

In the Bucknell Latin American Project, we became increasingly aware that the Venas Abiertas: Escenas sobre Latinoamérica collage would evolve from the collective efforts of a number of artists. Individual scenes, dances, monologues, poems, songs, etc. might represent the work of a particular poet, playwright, choreographer, or musician; however, the totality of the collage, in its conception and execution, would represent the vision, experiences, and reflection of a group. This total vision is fraught with paradox and contradiction. Composed of artists from Hispanic, Latino, and European backgrounds, with some guest artists new to Bucknell, as well as members of the Bucknell community from various disciplines, the collective's ideas on what we must say about Latin America vary from individual to individual.

The excitement about such a project results from its intercultural possibilities. Ignorant of much Latin American history, culture, and art, some of us were bound to gain new information; however, the perspective on this information gains priority in a situation where collective points of view predominate. An intercultural perspective makes visible those crossroads of experience where the problems of intercultural communication exist and the search for new forms of artistic expression is necessary. We hope that in a very limited way, within the confines of our institutional setting, we have touched the spirit of those generations of artists creating in our hemisphere more than 500 years ago.

GUEST ARTISTS

Craciela Daniele won a Tony award nomination for director/ choreographer of the Broadway musical hit Once on this Island, with music and lyrics by Lynn Ahrens and Stephen Flaherty. Once on this Island was presented at Playwright's Horizons in the Spring of 1990 and has been running on Broadway since October of 1990. Most recently Ms. Daniele worked as a choreographer on the production of The Snow Ball, a new play by A.R. Gurney, which was presented at the Hartford Stage and the Old Globe Theatre. Ms. Daniele's choreography was last represented on Broadway in Dangerous Games, a musical theatre piece conceived by Ms. Daniele which she co-wrote with Jim Lewis, with music by Astor Piazzolla and lyrics by William Finn. Her choreography has also been seen on television and in film. Through a grant from the Bucknell Association for the Arts, Ms. Daniele premiered "Adios" at Bucknell in the fall of 1991.

Bernardo Solano received an MFA in playwriting from the Yale School of Drama. He won a Fulbright Fellowship in Colombia, his native country, and he is a McKnight Fellow at the Los Angeles Playwrights Center. His play The Death and Life of Luis Rodriguez won the National Playwriting Award from the Mixed Blood Theatre in Minneapolis. Mr. Solano has also written plays for the 13th Street Theatre, Cucaracha Theatre, and INTAR in New York City. He has recently returned from Toledo, Spain, where he conducted research for a libretto to an opera based on the life and work of El Greco, and he is currently working on a play about Brazilian rainforests for the South Coast Repertory. Two of his plays were performed at Bucknell last month: Speak Spanish for Me was seen in Cap & Dagger's Evening of One Acts and a staged reading of Buenavista was part of the Latin American Project. Through a grant from the Bucknell Association for the Arts, Mr. Solano spent a month as a Bucknell Playwright in Residence, teaching, writing, and lecturing on Colombian Theatre.

Eugenio Huanca was born in Chile where he mastered twenty wind, string, and percussion instruments. In 1983, Mr. Huanca formed the Guamary Ensemble and created the sound track for the BBC film, Flight of the Condor. Currently he is a resident of Northampton, Massachusetts where he plays with Quetzal, an intercultural band of blues and jazz musicians. Funded by a grant from the Bucknell Association for the Arts, Mr. Huanca's residency has included work with Lewisburg High School students.
