Stop! (In the Name of Love)

Following the principles of Forum Theatre, a theatrical technique pioneered by Augusto Boal, *Can We Talk About It?: Recurrence* was conceived and developed by Bucknell University students under the guidance of cfrancis blackchild over two semesters. The play explores social issues germane to the Bucknell Community and invites the community to join the conversation in search of a more productive outcome.

Forum Theatre is one of several techniques that falls within the Theatre and Social Change designation. In Forum Theatre a short play representing a community concern is shown twice. The first performance unfolds in the familiar Aristotelian mode, where there is an invisible "fourth wall" between the performers and audience. In Forum Theatre there are no spectators. Instead, the audience are members of the community who both observe and have the potential to act (spect-actors). After the first performance spect-actors participate in a talkback with the play's characters to better understand their motivations. At the conclusion of the talkback, the play restarts. During the replay, spect-actors are encouraged to enter the narrative and work to improve the situation. With a cry of 'Stop!' a spect-actor steps on stage and intervenes in the action in pursuit of a more productive outcome. The process is repeated, as time permits, to allow as many spect-actors as possible to intervene. Perfection is not required of the spect-actors' solution, only a good faith effort. The entire process is guided by the ensemble's facilitators.


Recurrence is one of two plays conceived in THEA 390 last semester. Both plays look at persistent social problems that were identified in Bucknell University 2011 College Climate report that persists today. They used national data, the research of Bucknell scholars, Drs. Flack, Delsandro, Holt and Dr. Rojas, as well as student input.

This semester the *Recurrence* ensemble and I continued to develop the script. The students of THEA 390 had given us a strong foundation to build on and members of the performance ensemble were extraordinarily generous with information about intricacies of life at Bucknell University. The title *Recurrence* refers to the persistence of anti-black incidences in Predominantly White Institution (PWI) particularly during Black History Month.


Instead of sitting back and relaxing, which is an appropriate posture for an Aristotelian audience, I ask that you lean forward and listen, and look out for that moment when you can yell 'STOP' (in the name of love) and enter the play to work toward a better outcome.

She teaches acting, Applied and Interactive Theatre, African American Theatre History, and playwriting. cfrancis serves as the Theatrical Intimacy Specialist for the department.
