

## DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Anjalee Deshpande Hutchinson Sweet Science of Bruising 2024

Are we living in a dystopian novel or are we on the hero's journey?

We live in cynical times. Problematic times. Traumatic times. Is this very different from what came before? Or have we been fighting oppressive forces for generations? The youngest adults among us seem the most affected by pessimism of the culture we live in. They are most susceptible to the belief that the world is in freefall, that we cannot effect change, that nothing we do matters in the long run.

And yet, when hope somehow manifests itself through courage, the courage to say yes, to say "I will try to win the game despite the hand I was dealt", or to say "I am capable of winning, that we are capable of winning" - somehow the world begins to shift on its axis and we are no longer without the power to make change. Power seems to require hope, or rather - the courage to hope, in order to manifest.

This is not a show about boxing. Rather, boxing and fighting are ways for the women in this story to manifest their inner strength and power. Power over their own lives, over their own autonomy, over their own journeys. Although there are many depictions in this play about the oppression, trauma and victimization these women face during the time that they lived, this is not a play about their injuries. It is a play about their journeys towards healing. Because a bruise is not a fixed thing. A bruise is not a permanent wound. A bruise is the body, having taken impact, in the process of healing itself. The strong and resilient women of this play are able to heal themselves and their communities from the injuries of the time they live in and the people who seek to control them and do them harm. They are not bound by who they are told they should be or what they are told they should fear. Rather, they find the strength to define their own journeys, identities and possibilities. Individually - and together in community, when all odds are against them - they find the strength to fight and to win.

What if this is not just a story, but a reminder? What if all of the visible and invisible bruises of our lives and our times are not permanent wounds but rather, temporary impacts of our fight to overcome perpetual forces that seek to control and to harm. What if our world, black and blue and seemingly beaten, is already in the process of healing? In the process of getting back up. In the process of fighting back. What if our spirits are more resilient than the punches we've taken. Imagine the future we could win together.
