Twelfth Night, or What You Will, first performed in 1602, takes the first half of its title from the English holiday celebrated on the Twelfth Day of Christmas, otherwise known as the Feast of the Epiphany. In Elizabethan England, Twelfth Night was a feast of unruliness, a festival of drinking, dancing, and storytelling. What You Will, the second half of the play's title, speaks both to this season of chaotic revelry and to the space of fantasy and wish fulfillment that is the theatre. However, not everyone in the world of Illyria can afford the space of fantasy. Yes, some of the play's characters do find that their fantasies come true, but others find themselves cruelly punished for daring to fantasize at all.

We encounter the world of Illyria towards the end of the interwar period between World War I and World War II, a time greatly concerned with freedom and social upheaval. The Treaty of Versailles, meant to establish lasting peace and to prevent further wars, is failing to do so. What was intended to ensure the ultimate freedom has, instead, laid down an inescapable path towards an even greater conflict. It is on this path that we find our players, also greatly concerned with social upheaval and with enacting their own liberties.

Freedom, and the movement it allows, appears on a sliding scale in *Twelfth Night*. Duke Orsino and Lady Olivia, both wealthy, young, and powerful, have bountiful freedom and opportunity at their disposal and yet they are "melancholic" and passive. Orsino can't even muster the strength to woo Olivia himself, opting instead to send various messengers on his behalf. Olivia is sick in mourning for her brother's death and seems displeased with and unimpressed by the autonomy that death has allowed her within her household. Olivia's mourning, "addicted to a melancholy," is in utter contrast to the way Viola, Illyria's newest arrival, mourns for the loss of *her* brother, Sebastian. Viola's response to what she believes to be her brother's death is resourceful and active and embraces movement. Viola's lively spirit acts as a cure to the willful nonparticipation of both Olivia and Orsino. However, inactive or not, Orsino's liberty is beautiful to Viola, who swiftly falls in love with him and it.

Viola herself is encountering a wider range of autonomy and movement, provided to her by her masculine disguise. Identical twins are a trope Shakespeare has played with before, in *Comedy of Errors*, but for *Twelfth Night* he makes an important change: our twins are of different sexes. This enables us to witness the freeing function of erotic ambiguity and sexual disguise. Viola's disguise liberates her from the societal limitations of her gender, but it also frees Orsino and Olivia from their respective melancholies and passivities.

Sir Toby, seemingly, has all the opportunity which accompanies an upper-class gentleman, but he is trapped under the weight of his post-war trauma and the alcoholism it inspires. Malvolio, Olivia's manservant, is abused for his awareness of his place as a high-ranking employee in the household and for his daydreams of aristocratic elevation. His social climbing fantasies are rebuked within the play, and his onstage imprisonment is highly emblematic of the static nature of his social standing. Maria, alternatively, is rewarded for very similar behavior and for her upwardly mobile intentions. She ultimately attains her desired ascension in her match with Sir Toby. Gender, it seems, colors the lens by which certain fantasies are viewed and played out.

Themes of freedom and social mobility are staggeringly relevant today. The liberty of movement that some bodies enjoy over others is still noticeable and the passivity that is often found amongst those with the greatest of freedoms has not narrowed. Who is forgotten at the end of this play as we applaud two marriages? What happens to Malvolio after *Twelfth Night* has ended? What becomes of Sir Andrew and Antonio, and all those who have aided our heroes and heroines, only to be discarded upon resolution of plot? Amidst this complex picture of Illyria, we are left with what Marjorie Garber describes as "a beautiful and profound vision of humankind in the midst of a tragic universe." Finally, Feste the Fool is left onstage at the play's end. With that, *Twelfth Night* reminds us that within this tragic universe we must listen to our fools and, above all else, we mustn't forget to laugh.
