Having Tom Yuschok as Music Director is like having an actor in the pit, so great is his sensitivity to the needs of the company on stage. We are able to use the full Broadway score for *COMPANY*, thanks to the superb musicianship of the twenty-seven wondrous ladies and gentlemen who comprise our orchestra. The score is further enriched by the sublime harmonies of our Vocal Quartet: Virginia Church, Mary Beth Gray, Lisa Lawmaster, Barb Reed.

The following "houghts are excerpted from the Public Broadcasting System's Musicaⁱ Fonight and were written by Sylvia Fine.

"Every from the by acci commimusica least hell s that you can't separate the good — certainly the great — plays which they were written. Oklahoma was written, probably not n we were fighting a war to which the whole country was totally ere fighting for everything we believe in and stand for. The 1970

musica NY, however, was written during an unpopular war which at least half the people didn't understand or believe in; which divided the country, split parents from children, and caused bloody riots and bitter disillusionment. And COMPANY both reflects that war and goes beyond it.

"COMPANY" was the first new turn in musical comedy since Oklahoma; its music is as contemporary as rock, but out of a different bag — that of Stravinsky, Copeland, possibly Ravel — its lyrics absolutely brilliant, both written by Stephen Sondheim, the wunderkind of the seventies. The book, almost Brechtian in its approach, has little story-line per se, but is rather a cold fish-eye look at a number of people involved in a situation and in their search for a solution. It is told in a loosely-tied series of cynical vignettes written by George Furth.

"COMPANY is ostensibly a study of marriage, of five married couples and their pet bachelor. Perhaps that's all Sondheim and Furth thought they were writing about. But most good writers have an unconscious sixth sense for the winds of change before even the slightest breeze is felt; and that, I think, is quite apparent in COM-PANY which was four or five years before its time. In 1970 we had a nation united and against and, heaven knows, they had some justification: against the war, against government, against parents, against school, against discipline...and not for anything much except their own thing which was usually themselves. But when the war ended they seemed to go into a state of limbo, lost and alone without their cause. The seventies have proved to be a time of uncertainty and seeking, of narcissicism hiding in a fantasy of closeness...and that is what COMPANY is all about." Music and Lyrics by STEPHEN SONDHEIM
