NOTES on PLAY'S ACTION & SETTING:

The action of the play is set in Belfast and spans more than three decades (from 1939 to 1972) in the life of a Protestant family in Belfast.

An elegant couch symbolizes Beth's house.

A china cabinet plus three large framed photographs of the grandfather in W.W. I Uniform, his son Samuel in W.W. II uniform; his grandson Sammy in modern army uniform, symbolize the little house that is occupied first by the grandparents and subsequently by Sarah.

Changes of lighting indicate changes of time and place.

Tea in a China Cup is performed with one intermission.

Smoking, the taking of photographs and the use of recording devices are strictly prohibited.

PROGRAM NOTES

THE PLAYWRIGHT

Christina Reid was born and educated in Belfast, where she lived until 1987. She was writer-in-residence at the Lyric Theatre, Belfast, 1983-84, and also at the Young Vic, London, 1988-89. She lives in London with her three daughters,

Reid's plays for television, radio, and stage have been produced and acclaimed in Ireland, England, Scotland, Europe and America. *Tea in a China Cup*, her first play, won the Thames TV Playwright Scheme Award in 1983, and was runner-up in The Irish Times/Dublin Theatre Festival/Women's Play Competition, 1982. She has since won numerous playwrighting awards, and has had plays produced at The Royal Court Theatre. The Royal Shakespeare Company, BBC Radio, Channel Four Television, and at other theatres throughout the U.K.

The world of Reid's plays is contemporary Belfast. She writes sympathetically about both extremists and moderates. Narrow perspectives often mark extremists, but humor plays a large part in all her work. Reid graphically presents the horrors of the present violence in northern Ireland, and the bigotry and prejudice woven over generations. Her plays, however, are very funny: the resilience and humor of her characters are notes of optimism in a grim situation.

A NORTHERN IRISH GLOSSARY - TERMS USED IN THIS PLAY

- TAGUES derogatory term for Catholics used by Protestants
- PRODS derogatory term for Protestants used by Catholics
- FENIANS common term for Catholics; the Fenians or Irish Republican
 Brotherhood was a revolutionary society founded in 1858 to overthrow
 British rule, and its spirit lives on in the Irish Republican Army.
- BIN LIDS In the late 60's and early 70's, Catholic women would alert their community that the British forces and Protestant police were about to invade their neighborhood by banging metal trash can covers on the streets.
- IRA Irish Republican Army the primary Nationalist (Catholic) paramilitary armed force.
- LAMBEG DRUM the largest of Protestant marching drums, symbolic of the power of the victorious Orange Order.
- ULSTER another name for the counties that make up Northern Ireland, where the Protestant population outnumbers the Catholic.
- ORANGEMEN Protestants; The Loyal Orange Order is a world-wide Irish society dedicated to defending Protestant interests.
- THE TROUBLES the violent conflagrations between Catholics and Protestants in the late 1960's and 1970's.

SELECTED HISTORICAL DATES, FACTS & EVENTS

- July 12, 1690 Protestant King of England, William of Orange defeats dispossessed Catholic King of England, James II, at the Battle of the Boyne (on Irish soil)
- 1922 Formation of the Irish Republic in the 26 predominantly Catholic southern counties of Ireland. The 6 predominantly Protestant counties of Ulster remain part of the United Kingdom.
- 1968 The Catholic civil rights movement begins in Northern Ireland, resulting in violent conflagrations throughout Northern Ireland
- 1969 British troops arrive in Ulster
- 1971 First British soldier killed in "Troubles." Protestant Prime Minister of Northern Ireland introduces "intemment" policy of imprisoning all suspected of subversion against the state. This causes riots, hunger strikes, firebombings and other acts of violent protest.
- January 20, 1972 Bloody Sunday in Derry, Northern Ireland: British troops kill 13 civilians during peaceful Catholic civil rights march, causing days of IRA bombings and acts of revenge and counter-attacks throughout Northern Ireland. Northern Irish government suspended and direct rule from London is imposed. Twenty thousand additional British troops enter Northern Ireland to restore order.
- If people say they understand the Northern Ireland situation, you know they have been badly misinformed.
