This concert is dedicated in loving memory to Iris Rifkin-Gainer, a dear teacher, colleague, author, dance therapist, and friend. She was a beloved member of the Lewisburg and Bucknell communities as an advocate for the arts, social justice, and inclusion.



Iris had been a lifelong student of Dance/Movement Therapy pioneer, Blanche Evan, and served as the interim director

for Ms. Evan's DT Center in NYC in the 1970s. Iris received her M.A. in Dance at the University of Illinois, Urbana in 1970, and worked as a dance therapist in New Haven and New York City. She was also a faculty member in N.Y.Urs Graduate Dance Therapy Program for 14 years. Over several decades, Iris led DT workshops at Kinections in Rochester, Hope College, Beijing Dance Therapy Institute, Froebei College at Rochampton University in London, Naropa institute, Smith College, and Bucknell. Iris also contributed several articles in her field to both professional Dance Therapy journals and books.

Iris came of age as a poet in the 1960's within the New York School of Poetry scene, working in and around the vibrant St. Mark's Poetry Project. A few of Iris' early poems from this era were published in small magazines and in The World Anthology: Poems From The St. Mark's Poetry Project (1969). In 2022, Iris had two poems in The Café Review, an issue featuring some of the writers and visual artists from this fervent artistic community.

In 1985, Iris, moved from New York City to Lewisburg with her husband Robert (8ob), and daughter Sarah, when 8ob joined Bucknell's English Department Theatre Program, Iris proudly served as the new Weis Center for The Performing Arts' Outreach Arts Coordinator for 12 years. Under the Bucknell literary and arts umbrella, she relished poetry workshops and readings offered by the Stadler Center For Poetry and Literary Arts and was a devoted longlime member and convener of the Feminist Fiction Reading Group.

Iris occasionally performed within Bucknell dance and theatre productions, including the 2010 version of Kelly Knox's the LOYE project, as well as guest teaching lectures and classes for the dance program. We love and miss her.

On February 14, 2018, seventeen lives were lost at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. The length of this piece, six minutes and twenty seconds, represents the amount of time that students, faculty, and staff were frozen with fear, waiting for the threat of gun violence to cease, Jaime Guttenberg was a 14-year-old dancer from Parkland, Florida, whose life was taken way too soon as a result of gun violence on this day. Dance studios across the country began wearing Orange Ribbons For Jaime on ja ckets, bags, costumes, and other dance apparel in honor of Jaime's favorite color being orange, which also happens to be the official color of gun violence awareness. Jaime was always considered to be the "life of the party," and was known to be incredibly wise. This piece is dedicated to her and to all lives lost at the hands of gun violence in America.

Idle Labyrinth represents my own journey discovering, reconciling with, and flourishing in my queer identity throughout my youth and collegiate life. It tackles themes of living in a heteronormative society and exploring beauty and sanctity in the LGBT community. Four tracks follow inner turmoil, experiences of a new world, love. and pride. Voguing and whacking are two historically queer dance styles seen in this piece. Vogue as a dance form was created in Harlem during the 1970s and 80s within traditionally Black and Latino spaces. New York drag competitions titled "balls" in these spaces transformed pageantry to vogue. Whacking originated during the 1970s in the gay disco clubs of Los Angeles where gueer Black, Lating, and Asian men gioneered the dance form in a journey of expression when society at large worked against them. I hope to pay homage to the beautiful history of queer dance forms and illuminate the community that helped me discover who I am.

Guest Artist Biographies

Kurt A. Douglas is a graduate of New York's LaGuardia High School of Music Art & the Performing Arts. Originally from Guyana, South America, Mr. Douglas earned an M.F.A, in dance from Hollins University and a B.F.A. from Boston Conservatory, He was a member of the Umón Dance Company, where he performed in many of Limón's most influential works and became the first African American to portray lago in Limón's masterpiece, The Moor's Pavane, Mr. Douglas has also danced with Ballet Hispánico under the direction of Tina Ramirez and toured throughout the United States and Asia for the Lar Lubovitch Dance Companys 40th anniversary season. He was in the world tour of the Tony Award-winning musical A Chorus Line and danced 5 seasons in the Radio City Christmas Spectacular. In 2002 he received a Princess Grace Award and was invited to perform for the royal family of Monaco. He was named one of Dance Magazine's "Top 25 to Watch" in the January 2006 issue. Kurt Douglas joined the Boston Conservatory at Berklee faculty in 2015 where he is an instructor of technique, repertory, critical theory, and pedagogy for modern dance. He is also artistic director for the Boston Conservatory at Berklee's Summer Dance Intensive. Kurt serves on faculty with the Limón for Kids Program and the Limón Institute in New York City, and continues to reconstruct and stage Limón's work all over the world.

Genevieve Hartnett (Class of 2017) is currently a Talent Acquisition Recruiter with Intuit and a Freelance Grant Writer. She began her dance experience at the Rock School for Dance Education in Philadelphia, training and competing in ballet, jazz, contemporary, hip hop, and theatre. Her passion for dance and the liberal arts led her to Bucknell University as a Merit Scholar for Dance, where she continued her dance training and worked with Bucknell faculty, Tara Keating of BalletX, Li-Chou Cheng, Nathaniel Hunt, and Jeffrey Peterson. In addition to her onstage performances, she also developed her skills in choreography in the Dance Program productions and served as the Movement Director for the theater program's production of Next to Normal. After graduating cum laude with a B.A. in International Relations and a double minor in French and Dance, she has enjoyed a career across the non-profit performing arts and the media and tech world in Philadelphia, working with BalletX, Comcast NBCUniversal, and now Intuit. As a performer, she has danced for indie-pop artist Devon in music videos as well as at I've performances at Mercury Lounge in New York City and Toklo Head House in Philadelphia. She lives with her fiancé in Philadelphia where she continues to dance.

José Limón was one of the most prominent American choreographers in modern dance. His powerful choreography often focused on human drama, incorporating themes from literature, history or religion. Throughout his career, Limón worked to change the image of the male in dance and bring it to a new stature and recognition. Born in 1908 in Culiacan, Mexico, Limón moved to the United States with his family when he was seven years old. He became interested in dance at the age of twenty, after moving to New York City to study painting. He began his studies with pioneer modern dancers Doris Humphrey and Charles Weidman, and was soon invited to join their company, In 1946 he founded his own company, Limón is best known for his masterpiece, The Moor's Pavane, based on Shakespeare's Othello. He choreographed over seventy-four other works, including The Traitor, The Exiles, There is a Time, Chaconne, Emperor Janes, Carlota, Dances for Isadora, and The Unsung, José Limón died on December 2, 1972. Today, the José Limón Dance Foundation continues his work through two entities: the Limón Dance Company, an international touring repertory company, and the Limón Institute, an educational and archival resource organization.

Jessica Lin has been with Xuejuan Dance Ensemble in Fairfax, Virginia for nine years. She has performed widely in the Washington DC metro area in venues including the Kennedy Center and the Smithsonian's National Museum of Asian Art. She lowes both Chinese folk dance and Chinese classical dance and has been studying them since she was four. Jessica has participated in the Taoli World Dance Competition since 2016. She has consistently placed in the highest category of awards (Elite Piatinum) with both classical and folk pieces. She has also received special awards such as highest scores in age/dance categories and performance award (Expressive Heart). She enjoys how Chinese dance links her to her Chinese hentage and reveals the great diversity in Chinese artistic expression.

Mabelle Liu hails from Howard County, Maryland, and has been a member of the Xuejuan Dance Ensemble since 2017. She has received training in both ballet and Chinese dance since the age of four, and participated in the Inaugural Taoli World Dance Competition for her first solo at the age of seven, receiving a Platinum award in the Washington DC Regional, and a Gold award in the World Final. Most recently, she won the elite platinum award in 2021, in the finals of the Taoli World Dance Competition, and in 2022 at regionals, where she was the awarded highest scoring soloist in her age division for Chinese Folk Dance, in the advanced level, and for Dynamic Costume. Mabelle is passionate about promoting her Chinese cultural heritage through dance.
