DIRECTOR'S NOTES

For the last five years at Bucknell, I have been directing tragedies. Although I have engaged in a little realism, a little fantasy and one enormous period romance — the theme of my directing oeuvre here in Lewisburg has notably been a bit 'heavy.' From *Blood Wedding* to *The Bacchae* to *Macbeth*, there has been a lot of bloodshed. And Frankly, I blame this squarely on my home life.

I am a mom. I have two volatile teenagers, a temperamental three year old and an eight year old who is known for his ill-timed daydreaming. I also have a husband who enjoys long motorcycle rides in the country, sometimes when he is supposed to be picking up children from activities. Our house is prone to drama. As a parent, I know we always have choices. Turn the other cheek, stay on the same team, rise above the crazy...but in the heat of the moment when I find myself steeping in the thick of it I find there's often nothing helpful for the frustration seeping out every pore. But there is another choice, an obvious choice; laughter. Better to laugh, I know, than to grind your teeth at night. Better to laugh than replay that annoying conversation over and over in your head. Better to laugh than to take your kid's cell phone and send it sailing out the car window and into the Susquehanna.

A very wise friend of mine once told me a story about how family gatherings really used to bother him but how he and his wife would laugh about them afterwards. Then he had the revelation to imagine himself outside of the situation while it was happening and laugh at himself in the moment. And isn't that just the key to comedy as a whole? Put yourself outside the situation, take delight in the ridiculousness, the lack of proportion, the clash of personalities and ideas. And although there are some things in life that truly are tragic, things that we can't laugh at today or a year from today, so much of our lives are invitations to laughter and opportunities for joy. If only poor suffering Brindsley could see the comedy around him, life would be a

matter what happened today, I love being in the audience. I love enjoying the circus together; together with my kids, together with my husband and together with this whole audience as only theatre can provide. I look forward to us laughing together and taking that laughter home into our silly, frustrating, wonderful lives. I may never direct tragedy again. — Anjalee Deshpande Hutchinson
