Steven Draheim (1963-2013)

Steven Draheim was a devoted educator at Bucknell University from Fall 1990 to Spring 1994 serving as the Lighting Designer and Technical Director for the Department of Theatre and Dance. Steve's passion for lighting dance began here and his friendship with his Bucknell collaborators remained strong during his appointments to Montclair State University, Augsburg College, Alma College, and during his tenure as Associate Professor of Lighting Design in the School of Drama at the University of Oklahoma, where he was coordinator of the Design and Production Area. He was also the Lighting Director for the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute and Instructor of Theatre Design and Technology in the Theatre Arts Division at Interlochen Arts Camp from 1997-2004. Steve continued to share his artistry with us by returning to Bucknell as the Guest Lighting Designer for Spring Dance Concerts (2000, 2001, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2009, 2012). Always the caring teacher, Steve was the perfect collaborator for student choreographers as well as a brilliant interpreter of the work of a new dance faculty and guest choreographers.



Joan Moyer Clark (1939-2013)

Joan Moyer Clark, a graduate of the Peabody Conservatory, inspired generations of dancers in our region. We are grateful that Joan's 60 years of teaching included dance classes at Bucknell which were foundational to the academic program in dance that our current students enjoy. Beginning in the mid 1950s, Joan collaborated with Harvey M. Powers choreographing musicals for the Theatre Program that was then part of the English Department. In the 1960s and 1970s, Joan taught dance courses as part of Women's Physical Education. She also choreographed for the Bucknell Dance Company (which fused two dance clubs in the late 1970s). In 1986, the Bucknell University Dance Ensemble featured her choreography set to Professor William Duckworth's acclaimed The Time Curve Preludes. In 1980, Joan received a special achievement award from the Bucknell Association for the Arts for significant contributions to the arts at Bucknell University and the surrounding community. Joan Moyer Clark founded and directed the Moyer Institute of Dance that, three generations later, continues to offer dance lessons in this area.

The family of Joan Moyer Clark would like to extend our gratitude for honoring her on this special evening. She was a catalyst for culture and inspiration at Bucknell through her development of the dance program and through her service to the University for several decades. As a dedicated teacher she provided training for many students at Bucknell of which many went on to become professional dancers under her tutelage. She continues to be a presence in the valley through the Moyer Institute of Dance as well as through the many students who continue to pay it forward in honor of her mission and philosophy.

Guest Artist Biographies

NOAH FRAM (Composer & Musician) is a recent graduate of Vanderbilt University, where he studied mathematics and theatre. He has performed as a djembe soloist, concert pianist, and timpanist, as well as dabbling in guitar and discovering firsthand why bassists deserve more credit than they get. His previous credits include: *The Mystery of Edwin Drood* (projection design, Bucknell); *The Good Person of Setzuan* (music composition, Vanderbilt University); *The Corporation* (guitars, percussion, keyboards, bass, vocals); and various pit orchestras, including fencing the Pirate King with a xylophone mallet in *Pirates of Penzance*.

SALIM GAUWLOOS' (Choreographer) career started when he began training in Belgium at the Ballet of Flanders in Antwerp. In 1990 he moved to New York City and began his association with Madonna. He is most famous for his performances in *The Blond Ambition Tour*, the documentary film, *Truth or Dare*, and he is also the face of Madonna's iconic video, *Vogue*. In addition he has performed with artists such as George Michael, Aretha Franklin, Toni Braxton, Taylor Dane and Britney Spears. Salim has acquired a reputation as not only an extraordinary dancer and teacher, but also as an exceptionally gifted choreographer.

PHIL HAYNES (Musician) is a 20-year veteran New York based artist. He is featured on more than 65 LP, DVD and CD releases by numerous American and European record labels. His recording credentials include many of the seminal musicians of this generation: saxophonists Anthony Braxton, Ellery Eskelin, and David Liebman; trumpeters Dave Douglas, Herb Robertson, and Paul Smoker; bassists Mark Dresser, Ken Filiano, and Drew Gress; keyboard artists David Kikoski, Denman Maroney, and Michelle Rosewoman; vocalists Theo Bleckman, Nicholas Horner, and Hank Roberts; violinist Mark Feldman, and the composers collective *Joint Venture*. Current Haynes touring ensembles include his: romantic 'jazz-grass' string band, *Free Country*, featuring vocalist/cellist Hank Roberts; definitive saxophone trio, *No Fast Food*, with NEA jazz master David Liebman; bluesy organ unit, *The Hammond Brothers*, as well as the classic piano trio, *Day Dream*, a cooperative with Yamaha artist Steve Rudolph.

ALEX HOROWITZ (Musician) currently a sophomore majoring in Managing for Sustainability at Bucknell University, is an accomplished Jazz Upright and Electric Bassist. He has recently played in senior Jazz recitals given by Molly Miller and Jordan Makansi, is a member of the Bucknell Jazz Band, and is the bassist for The Bucknell Jazz Experience, an advanced Jazz combo on campus. He is currently working on the creation of a Miles Davis tribute quartet as well as a small contemporary Jazz combo. Alex has a passion for all things music and enjoys listening to all genres (with the exception of country), as well as playing and producing other types of music including Funk, Hip-Hop/Rap, Indie Rock, and EDM.

TARA KEATING (Restaging) began her dance training at the age of seven at the Pioneer Valley Ballet in Northampton, Massachusetts. She attended The Juilliard School, under the direction of Benjamin Harkavy, where she received a BFA in Dance. She has danced professionally with American Repertory Ballet, "Tharp!," and as a soloist with Pennsylvania Ballet. In 2005, she became a founding member of BalletX and danced in nearly every performance until her retirement in 2012. She has staged numerous balletS on BalletX

and has set Neenan's work on Pennsylvania Ballet, Milwaukee Ballet, Nevada Ballet Theatre, Oregon Ballet Theatre, and Bucknell University. Alongside her role at BalletX, Tara is on faculty at various schools in the region.

WILLIAM KENYON (Lighting Designer) serves as Head of the Design & Technology Program, and runs the Lighting Design Program in the School of Theatre at Penn State. An active professional designer, Prof. Kenyon has designed over 150 plays, operas, and dances, along with over a dozen national and international tour seasons with several theatre and dance companies. Prof. Kenyon's recent work includes performances at The Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, Wolftrap, the Qatar International Arts Festival, and Bucknell University. Prof. Kenyon received his BFA from the University of Connecticut, and his MFA from Brandeis University. When not on tour or in tech, Prof. Kenyon is working on climbing the highest point in each U.S. state. He lives in Pennsylvania with his wife Jenny, a Costume and Scenic Designer, and his daughter Delaney.

BARRY LONG (Musician) is an Assistant Professor of Music at Bucknell University where he currently directs the jazz ensemble and teaches coursework in jazz and music theory. The first to receive a doctoral degree in Jazz Studies from the Eastman School of Music, he has performed with such artists as Kenny Wheeler, Bob Brookmeyer, John Clayton, Eliane Elias, Benny Carter, and Jim McNeely. Current projects include a jazz appreciation textbook for Prentice Hall and research on jazz and activism, which includes the performative *Freedom in the Air* project.

MELISSA LEONARD '12 (Assistant Choreographer) attended Bucknell University, where she was awarded the Arts Merit Scholarship for Dance. She graduated in 2012 with a degree in Neuroscience and a minor in Dance. While at Bucknell, Melissa choreographed two original pieces and performed with the Bucknell Dance Company in works by Er-Dong Hu, Kelly Knox, Dustyn Martincich, Tara Madsen, Salim Gauwloos, Cathy Young, and Nick Ross. Melissa works as a dance instructor at Dance Unlimited (NJ), where she teaches modern, ballet, tap, and jazz. Professionally, she has performed at EMP Collective's Connect the Dots Festival (MD), and with NetCo Dance Company (PA).

KELLY & MOLLYE MAXNER (Choreographers) serve on the drama faculty of UNCSA and both hold two BFA degrees from the North Carolina School of the Arts. The first in Contemporary Dance; and the second in Drama (Directing). Mollye and Kelly are founding members and co-artistic directors of the Open Dream Ensemble, a North Carolina School of the Arts multidisciplinary alumnae company supported by the Kenan Institute for the Arts. Mollye and Kelly have choreographed/directed for many professional Theatre companies. Mollye and Kelly Maxner are also the Co-Artistic Directors of Chimaera Physical Theater. As the co-artistic directors of Chimaera Physical Theater, they have produced performances internationally and across America including New York, Taiwan, Istanbul, Cairo, Dallas, Las Angeles, Washington DC, Minneapolis and many other spaces.

MARY KOKIE MCNAUGHER '02 (Costume Designer) has worked in theater, dance, television, and film as a costume designer and stylist. Mary recently designed Tiffany Mills' world premiere "It Only Happens Once...Yesterday and Tomorrow;" for Randy James' 10 Hairy Legs' Major Artists Series, "The Feast (Part 1);" for Tiffany Mills Company at BAM; Verizon "Joy" commercial starring dancer Rafael Martin directed by Edouard Salier; the short film "Standing By" by Rob Ackerman directed by Conrad Fink; the world premiere of "The Only Moving Thing" by eighth blackbird, staged by Susan Marshall, and Susan Marshall & Company's "Frame Dances." Mary began her career in the Professional Internship Program at the Juilliard School, where she is currently designing two pieces for the Dance Division. She has a BA in theatre and art from Bucknell University.

MATTHEW NEENAN (Choreographer) danced with the Pennsylvania Ballet where he danced numerous principal roles. In October 2007, Matthew was named Choreographer in Residence at the Pennsylvania Ballet. Matthew's choreography has been featured and performed by the Pennsylvania Ballet (totaling 13 commissions), including BalletX. He has received numerous awards and grants for his choreography from the National Endowment of the Arts, Dance Advance funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts, the Choo San Goh Foundation, and the Independence Foundation. In 2005, Matthew co-founded BalletX with fellow dancer Christine Cox. BalletX had its world premiere at the Philadelphia Live Arts Festival in September 2005 and is now the resident dance company at the prestigious Wilma Theatre.
