Directors Note

Almost two years ago, the department of theatre and dance at Bucknell decided to create a brand-new devised production. Allison Oddey, author of the 1996 textbook Devising Theatre defines devised theatre as 'a process of making theatre that enables a group of performers to be physically and practically creative in the sharing and shaping of an original product that directly emanates from assembling, editing and reshaping individual's contradictory experiences of the world. A devised theatre product is a work that has emerged from and been generated by a group of people working in collaboration. There is an emphasis on a way of working that values an accumulation of ideas'.

We spoke about a production that would be written, designed and performed solely by students. The season selection committee, made up of both faculty and students, asked what topics the students were most interested in exploring. Topics that rose to the surface were anxiety, miscommunication, and loneliness. In addition, the committee was also interested in narrative, so the biblical story of the Tower of Babel became another source of inspiration. With only these few elements, we began the long process of creating the show you see here tonight.

Last spring for 5 months students trained in a devising technique known as Moment Work, created by the Tectonic Theatre Project, the world-famous award-winning theatre company whose devised works (The Laramie Project, Gross Indecency, I Am My Own Wife) have been performed world-wide. Moment work was the first step in training students to think about theatre horizontally. That is, to think about theatre making as more than the presentation of a script but rather a collection of storytelling possibilities which include design, movement, song and text all of which can be used interchangeably and collaboratively. At the end of the spring we auditioned students for the more advanced THEA 342 course which would take the initial ideas discovered forward into a full production in the fall.

Over this past summer two talented research students worked for 8-weeks to take the discoveries made in the spring THEA 242 Devising course forward, continuing the explorations in both form and content, growing both narrative of the story we would tell as well as the unique visual way in which we would tell it. Then came this fall. Since late August, 27+ students have been working tirelessly to build a mountain of possibilities for the ways in which theatre can engage, challenge, provoke and inspire. They worked with light, set, props, costumes, music and text. We brought in amazing guest artists who encouraged the students with methods of writing

characters and narratives for the stage as well as songs and music. We kept creating until at long last we began to build characters, storylines, conflicts and resolutions. Although much of the work you will see on the stage today is fictional, almost all of it was autobiographical to start and all of these students shared their stories with incredible bravery. In addition, they worked not only on individual characters and storylines but on all the stories, growing each character through their challenges, victories and beyond. The characters the students created speak to the very heart of what students at this age struggle with each and every day.

And then as we created the final piece, students learned to let go of characters they loved, storylines that spoke to them, and beloved ideas that would go unseen in the final production as we trimmed, cut, and deleted sections in an effort to create a beautiful piece that would manifest only the most meaningful ideas in the most engaging way possible. We made these difficult choices based on the central question the students chose to explore through performance: How does who we once were determine who we will become? And although it was hard, the students allowed this question to lead to the way to a final production and trusted both the process and their director to weave all of their very precious stories into one cohesive work.

The central question also defines these brilliant humans who, just over a year ago, began simply as eager curious students and have become so much more. Performers became designers, designers became actors, stage managers became singers and they all became writers. Many of them do not even call the arts and humanities their home. We have engineers, scientists, entrepreneurs and many others nestled here neatly on the stage among the arts and humanities majors all working together to create something beautiful, meaningful, and new. Every one of these students have grown to be some of the most generous, collaborative, and prolific young artists I know. As my good friend and colleague Gregory Ramos states, in creating theatre, students not only learn about performance but in addition become 'deeply aware of other people and of the world around them. They become more diligent, inquisitive, creative, and compassionate people. They learn how to take action. They become more interested and more interesting. They learn and they grow toward a deeper understanding of who they are. And shouldn't that be the fundamental purpose of higher education?' These students have encapsulated the very best of this fundamental purpose and in doing so have created for us a play that demonstrates how the courage to share can change the world, one story at a time.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.



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
