

### Landmark Hotel Slated for Demolition

The Hotel Baltimore, on 63 East Madison Street, has joined the increasing number of hotels which are being torn down to make way for business offices and shopping centers.

Like the Pioneer, which is currently facing the wrecking ball, the Hotel Baltimore has been a landmark in the downtown area since the early 1900's.

In the 1920's, it was redecorated and redesigned in the Art Deco mode by F. Elaine Williams. She became famous for her distinctive use of vibrant colors and textures. Williams' exhibition, 'New Frontiers in Burlap' won several awards in the 1930's.

The hotel has seen too many years since Williams' work, according to Newgate Develop-

ment and Management, the company executing the demolition.

Concerned citizens have protested to Steve Chene, director of the Newgate firm. Chene responded to their criticism:

"By clearing Madison Avenue of its seedy and unsafe hotels, we will be cleaning up the area. This will boost the tourist trade, create more jobs, and generate more revenue. What's so bad that?"

Bill Lewis, night clerk at the Hotel Baltimore was upset at Chene's remarks.

"What about the people living here, and in the Pioneer, and the Weldon? These are residential hotels. Where will the homeless, elderly residents go?"

Barring a reprieve, demolition will begin July 1st.


